Adjectives and adverbs

Sometimes a single **adjective** is not enough to **describe** a noun or pronoun.



A **phrase** is a group of words.

We can use a **phrase** so that the reader has a clear picture of what we are writing about. Look at this picture.

We could describe the picture like this.

That tree is a **young** apple tree. **young** = single adjective



A reader would have a much clearer picture of the tree if we wrote:

That tree with the bare branches is a young apple tree. with the bare branches = adjective phrase

Sometimes, a single **adverb** is not enough to tell us **how**, when or where something happens.

We can use a **phrase** to describe **how**, **when** or **where** something happens so that the reader has a clear picture of what is happening.

Look at this picture.

We could write about what is happening like this:

The boy came downstairs **noisily**. **noisily** = single adverb A reader would have a much clearer idea of what happened if we wrote:

The boy came downstairs with heavy, thudding footsteps. with heavy, thudding footsteps = adverb phrase



An adverb phrase is also known as an adverbial.
